## Requirements for All Graduate Applications

- Completed graduate application form.
- Nonrefundable application fee by check or money order. The fee must be payable in U.S. currency and all checks must be drawn on U.S. banks. The University of the Arts graduates are exempt from the fee.

- Three letters of recommendation; one from each of the three people listed on the application. Two of these recommendations must come from professors in your field or professionals in this major area who are familiar with your capabilities and credentials.
- A one to two-page statement of professional plans and goals. See specific program requirements for additional information.

### Certification of Finances

*For International applicants only.*

The University requires that you submit proof of sufficient available funds to cover all of your educational and personal expenses while studying at The University of the Arts. This will be referred to as your Certification of Finances. A Certification of Finances form will be sent to you upon receipt of your application.

**This form must be completed in English and notarized by your bank official.**

This statement must declare the availability of funds of at least U.S. \$45,000, to cover the costs of each year of education and personal expenses. The I-20 form cannot be issued without a valid Certification of Finances.

### Application Deadlines Fall and Summer Enrollment

Applications for Fall admission and admission to

the summer low residence MFA programs may be submitted as follows:

#### **Priority Decision**

Applications received and completed prior to **January 15** for Fall enrollment will be reviewed for priority consideration. Applicants will be notified of the Admission Committee's decision on or before March 15. Applications received and completed prior to **January 1** for Summer enrollment will be reviewed for priority consideration. Applicants will be notified of the Admission Committee's decision on or before February 15.

#### **Rolling Admission**

Applications received after January 15 for Fall and Summer enrollment will be considered on a space available basis and reviewed on a rolling basis.

#### **Spring Enrollment**

Music and Art Education accept applications for Spring enrollment.

#### **Priority Decision**

Applications received and completed by November 1 will be notified of the admission decision on or before December 1.

#### **Rolling Admission**

Applications received and completed after November 1 will be considered on a space-available basis and reviewed on a rolling basis. Candidates can generally expect to be notified of a decision within two weeks of completing all application requirements.

#### **Financial Aid**

You must be accepted for admission before being considered for financial aid. An application for loans will have no effect on the decision concerning the admission of an applicant. The admission decision is made without having access to financial aid data. All graduate students, except for foreign nationals, requesting financial assistance from the University must submit the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA). No other application is needed for grants, scholarships or assistantships.

The FAFSA should be completed as early as possible, but no later than March 15. The FAFSA can be completed at <http://www.fafsa.ed.gov>.

The following types of financial assistance are available to graduate students:

1. Graduate Grants/Assistantships – These awards are merit-based and consist of a combination of a small cash assistantship and a grant to cover a portion of tuition. These awards are determined at the time of the acceptance offer. The awards have various responsibilities and award amounts and require a work commitment of 10 hours per week. Specific questions about these awards should be addressed directly to the chair or director of the program to which the student is applying. To receive a grant/assistantship, a student must normally be enrolled in a full-time course of study.
2. Graduate Scholarships – The MFA programs in ceramics/painting/sculpture award merit-based scholarships that do not require a work commitment.
3. Loans – Stafford Loans and Graduate PLUS loans are available to eligible students. To be considered for these loans, students must complete the FAFSA application. This loan is available to US Citizens and Permanent Residents only.

## College of Art and Design

### MFA Book Arts/Printmaking

Applicants should submit a portfolio of 20-30 digital images. These should represent the applicant's full range of studio experience, preferably including printmaking and book arts. Images must be clearly identified and must be accompanied by an inventory list giving title (or other identification), size, medium, and date of completion. If return of the portfolio is desired, a self-addressed, stamped envelope must be included. Applicants are also encouraged to submit selected original work. Original work should be mailed directly to the director of the program (Susan Viguers, MFA Book Arts/Printmaking) or dropped off at the time of the interview. Self-addressed, stamped packaging for return of original work must be provided. To make an appointment for an interview, email Susan Viguers. (sviguers@uarts.edu)

### Museum Studies

#### Master of Arts in Museum Communication

Applicants should submit a writing sample that demonstrates clarity of expression, creative thought, and, if appropriate, organized research. In addition, they should submit examples of work that relate to their professional interests, including but not limited to, press releases, brochures, grant applications, samples of database work, exhibitions, or programs. The materials may be submitted on paper or CD. Please enclose a self-addressed, stamped envelope for the return of materials.

#### Master of Arts in Museum Education

Applicants should submit examples of academic and professional writing as printed copy, published materials, or CD. Examples might include papers written at the college or university level; educational materials written for museums; lesson plans written for museums or schools. Applicants who are artists may submit slides or a CD of their work. Please enclose a self-addressed, stamped envelope for the return of materials.

#### MFA Museum Exhibition Planning & Design

Applicants are requested to submit a digital portfolio of their work preferably a disk with a well-organized slide show indicating their professional experience in the areas of art or design. If the applicant does not have a design or fine art background, other related experience will suffice, such as gallery installations, renovations, video/film, theater, etc. and/or writing samples. Writing samples in the professional realm preferred i.e. an exhibition catalog, label text, marketing materials, teaching plan, educational programs, press release, or grant proposal, to name a few. Major papers or thesis will suffice if only academic papers are available.

#### Master of Arts in Art Education & Master of Art in Teaching Visual Arts

Applicants should submit 10 to 20 slides, or other visual evidence representing studio experience.

#### MFA Low Residence Programs in Ceramics, Painting or Sculpture

Applicants should submit a digital portfolio of 20 images that represent the recent direction of the work as well as the full range of experience in the discipline to which application is being made. Images must be clearly identified and must be accompanied by an inventory list of the work indicating the image number, title or description or the work, size, medium, and date of completion. Original work should not be mailed to the Admission Office. Please enclose a self-addressed, stamped

envelope for the return of materials.

Applicants should note these are year-round programs that require three annual eight week, on-campus summer residences and off-campus independent study during the Fall and Spring semesters. These programs extend over two and a half years culminating in a thesis exhibition following completion of Summer III. New students begin in June only.

The MFA Low Residence Programs in Ceramics, Painting or Sculpture do not meet the United States Customs and Immigration Service's requirements for the F-1 student visa. Therefore, only US citizens and permanent residents are eligible to participate in these programs.

#### Master of Industrial Design

Applicants should submit a preliminary statement of objectives and a detailed description of career experience. Nonvisual evidence of research and professional ability should be included in the portfolio. Applicants may submit digital portfolios in lieu of, or in addition to color slides.

## College of Performing Arts

Applicants to the Master of Music in Jazz Studies must successfully complete a performance audition. In-person auditions are required, however videotaped auditions may be accepted from those applicants residing outside of the USA.

### Master of Music in Jazz Studies

#### Audition Requirements

The audition will consist of three elements:

1. A written entrance examination to measure competency in the following jazz/contemporary skills:
  - a. aural
  - b. theoretical
  - c. arranging
  - d. historical
2. An interview to discuss your educational and professional goals
3. A performance (see specific requirements for each instrument)

Students who are deficient in some requirements but who are, in the opinion of the adjudicating faculty, capable of attaining them between the time of their audition and actual entrance into the program, may be conditionally accepted.

### Guitar

#### Improvisation

- A performance (with a rhythm section or Aebersold CD) demonstrating proficiency, musicality, and improvisational ability with tunes from the standard jazz repertoire (i.e. All the Things You Are, Stella By Starlight, Cherokee) and a ballad

#### Scales/Modes/Arpeggios

(drawn from the lists at the end)

- Two octaves, four different fingerings, all performed from any pitch in eighth notes at a tempo of quarter note = 120

#### Sightreading

- Studies comparable to Charlie Parker Omnibook
- Demonstrate proficiency at sight reading standard big band or fusion arrangements

#### Other Performance Requirements

- Perform an advanced level etude (i.e. Joe Pass chord/melody)

- Present and perform a properly notated original transcription of a recorded solo of at least 32 bars (bring the recording)
- Demonstrate proficiency at comping in various styles
- Perform an unaccompanied chord/melody arrangement on a standard jazz tune using intricate voicings, single note fills, variations, and reharmonization

### Piano

#### Improvisation

- A performance (with a rhythm section or Aebersold CD) demonstrating proficiency, musicality, and improvisational ability with tunes from the standard jazz repertoire (i.e. All the Things You Are, Stella By Starlight, Cherokee) and a ballad

#### Scales/Modes/Arpeggios

(drawn from the lists at the end)

- Two hands, four octaves, all performed from any pitch in sixteenth notes at a tempo of quarter note = 108

#### Sightreading

- Demonstrate the ability to sight-read and interpret a lead sheet
- Demonstrate the ability to sight-read two hand piano arrangements
- Demonstrate proficiency at sight-reading standard big band or fusion arrangements

#### Other Performance Requirements

- Perform an advanced level etude or classical piece (may be an advanced jazz composition written for two hands)
- Present and perform a properly notated original transcription of a recorded solo of at least 32 bars (bring the recording)
- Demonstrate proficiency at comping in various styles
- Perform an original harmonic reworking of a tune from the standard repertoire

### Vibraphone

#### Improvisation

- A performance (with a rhythm section or Aebersold CD) demonstrating proficiency and musicality with tunes from the standard jazz repertoire (i.e. All the Things You Are, Stella By Starlight, Cherokee) and a ballad

#### Scales/Modes/Arpeggios

(drawn from the lists at the end)

- Two octaves, all performed from any pitch in sixteenth notes at a tempo of quarter note = 108

#### Sightreading

- Demonstrate ability to sightread chord progressions
- Demonstrate proficiency at sightreading standard big band or fusion arrangements

#### Other Performance Requirements

- Perform a solo from advanced four mallet repertoire which demonstrates pedal and damping techniques
- Perform a jazz solo transcription for vibraphone (minimum 32 bars)
- Present and perform a properly notated original transcription of a recorded solo of at least 16 bars for vibraphone (bring the recording)
- Demonstrate proficiency at comping in various styles
- Perform an unaccompanied chord/melody arrangement

## **Bass**

### **Improvisation**

- A performance (with a rhythm section or Aebersold CD) demonstrating proficiency and musicality with tunes from the standard jazz repertoire (i.e. All the Things You Are, Stella By Starlight, Cherokee) and a ballad

### **Scales/Modes/Arpeggios**

(drawn from the lists at the end)

- Two octaves, all performed from any pitch in eighth notes at a tempo of quarter note = 96

### **Sightreading**

- Demonstrate ability to sightread chord progressions
- Demonstrate proficiency at sightreading standard big band or fusion arrangements

### **Other Performance Requirements**

- Perform an advanced level etude or classical piece
- Perform a jazz solo transcription for bass (minimum 32 bars)
- Present and perform a properly notated original transcription of a recorded solo of at least 16 bars for bass (bring the recording)
- Demonstrate proficiency at performing appropriate bass lines in various styles

## **Saxophone and Woodwinds**

### **Improvisation**

- A performance (with a rhythm section or Aebersold CD) demonstrating proficiency and musicality with tunes from the standard jazz repertoire (i.e. All The Things You Are, Stella By Starlight, Cherokee) and a ballad

### **Scales/Modes/Arpeggios**

(drawn from the lists at the end)

- Entire range of the instrument, all performed from any pitch in eighth notes at a tempo of quarter note = 96

### **Sightreading**

- Demonstrate ability to sightread chord progressions
- Demonstrate proficiency at sightreading standard big band or fusion arrangements

### **Other Performance Requirements**

- Perform an advanced level etude (Fering, Karg-Elert, LaBanchi) or classical piece
- Perform a jazz solo transcription for saxophone (minimum 32 bars)\*
- Present and perform a properly notated original transcription of a recorded solo of at least 16 bars for saxophone (bring the recording)\*

\* Woodwind majors should apply these requirements to their specific instruments

## **Trumpet**

### **Improvisation**

- A performance (with a rhythm section or Aebersold CD) demonstrating proficiency and musicality with tunes from the standard jazz repertoire (i.e. All The Things You Are, Stella By Starlight, Cherokee) and a ballad

### **Scales/Modes/Arpeggios**

(drawn from the lists at the end)

- Two octaves, all performed from any pitch in eighth notes at a tempo of quarter note = 96

### **Sightreading**

- Demonstrate ability to sightread chord progressions
- Demonstrate proficiency at sightreading standard big band or fusion arrangements

### **Other Performance Requirements**

- Perform an advanced level etude (Charlier, Brandt, Bitsch, Smith) or classical piece
- Perform a jazz solo transcription for trumpet (minimum 32 bars)
- Present and perform a properly notated original transcription of a recorded solo of at least 16 bars for trumpet (bring the recording)
- Perform the head to Clifford Brown's "Joy Spring" from memory or "Donna Lee" from memory

## **Trombone**

### **Improvisation**

- A performance (with a rhythm section or Aebersold CD) demonstrating proficiency and musicality with tunes from the standard jazz repertoire (i.e. All The Things You Are, Stella By Starlight, Cherokee) and a ballad

### **Scales/Modes/Arpeggios**

(drawn from the lists at the end)

- Two octaves, all performed from any pitch in eighth notes at a tempo of quarter note = 96

### **Sightreading**

- Demonstrate ability to sightread chord progressions
- Demonstrate proficiency at sightreading standard big band or fusion arrangements

### **Other Performance Requirements**

- Perform an advanced level etude or classical piece
- Perform a jazz solo transcription for trombone (minimum 32 bars)
- Present and perform a properly notated original transcription of a recorded solo of at least 16 bars for trombone (bring the recording)

## **Drum Set**

### **Improvisation**

- Demonstrate (with a rhythm section) all jazz/contemporary styles (American, traditional, Brazilian, Afro-Cuban), selections from the standard jazz repertoire, using sticks and brushes from the standard jazz repertoire (i.e. All The Things You Are, Stella By Starlight, Cherokee) and a ballad
- Solos of all lengths (4s, 8s, 12s, chorus) demonstrating improvisational fluency and knowledge of song form (all tempos and meters)

### **Sightreading**

- Demonstrate proficiency at sightreading standard big band or fusion arrangements

### **Other Performance Requirements**

- Perform an advanced level snare drum etude demonstrating technical and rhythmic proficiency
- Perform a jazz solo transcription for drums (minimum 32 bars)
- Present and perform a properly notated original transcription of a recorded solo of at least 16 bars for drum (bring the recording)
- Perform an original solo drum set piece (composed by applicant/hand notated/minimum 2 minutes)

## **Voice**

### **Literature**

- A performance (with a rhythm section or Aebersold CD) demonstrating proficiency, musicality and improvisational ability (using scat syllables) with tunes from the standard jazz repertoire (i.e. All The Things You Are, Stella By Starlight, Cherokee) and a ballad

### **Scales/Modes/Arpeggios**

(drawn from the lists at the end)

- Entire range of the voice, all performed from any pitch in eighth notes at a tempo of quarter note = 96

### **Sightreading**

- Demonstrate ability to sightread melodies with lyric
- Demonstrate ability to sight-read lead sheets and vocal arrangements

### **Other Performance Requirements**

- Perform an advanced-level vocal etude
- Present and perform a properly notated transcription of a jazz vocal scat recording (minimum 32 bars)

## **MAT in Music Education**

In addition to general requirements for graduate admission to The University of the Arts, the following specific requirements apply to the MAT in Music Education program:

1. Successful completion (cumulative GPA of 3.0 or higher) of an undergraduate degree in musical performance, composition, theory, history/literature, or related field from an accredited college or university.
2. Successful completion (cumulative GPA of 3.0 or higher) of corequisite coursework and/or acquired competencies as follows:
  - a. Introductory course in Educational Psychology
  - b. Course in Child Growth Development
  - c. Knowledge of current issues, trends, and methods in music teaching, and lesson planning
  - d. Actual field experience involving observation, teaching, and lesson planning
  - e. Functional skills on piano
  - f. Course in basic conducting and score reading
  - g. Course in orchestration/arranging

**Note:** Corequisites may be satisfied through the following:

- a. Completion of The University of the Arts Music Education minor
  - b. Individual examination
  - c. Documented professional experience
  - d. Completion of appropriate courses at another institution
3. A DVD /CD of at least ten minutes of classroom or private teaching (maybe simulated), and/or conducting that demonstrates the applicant's teaching skill and musicianship.
  4. Successful live or taped performance audition. Audition may be waived for Bachelor of Music graduates of The University of the Arts. **Please contact the Office of Admission for specific audition requirements.**
  5. A letter of application including a description of career goals and the contribution that MAT degree study will make toward the attainment of those goals.
